How to encourage students to read for pleasure

The big challenge for teachers is not simply getting students to read – it's getting them to enjoy it too. It's one thing for students to read through set texts in a lesson, but will they open another book when they get home at the end of the day?

Leading Literacy Educators have noted that becoming a lifetime reader is based on developing a deep love of reading.

"Research has repeatedly shown that motivation to read decreases with age, especially if pupils' attitudes towards reading become less positive," it said. "If children do not enjoy reading when they are young, then they are unlikely to do so when they get older."

For younger readers in particular, their home environment is critically important.

"Home is a massive influence," says Eleanor Webster, a primary school teacher. "Supportive and understanding parents are key to developing their child's reading."

But if a pupil doesn't see people reading at home, it may be harder to instil the idea of reading for pleasure. So what can parents do to encourage it? Here are some of the best ideas, initiatives and projects that parents have developed to motivate children and help them develop a love for reading:

Escapism

While reading challenges can give a sense of purpose, escaping the challenges of school is a crucial part of encouraging reading for pleasure.

"Children won't find reading pleasurable if there is too much pressure on them," says Webster, "so a relaxed atmosphere and a positive ethos around reading is really important."

Promoting reading as a form of escapism from the general pressures of school and their social lives encouraged students to see reading as a form of self-indulgent relaxation, instead of another intelligence test.

Reading to your son or daughter

Encouraging children to read for pleasure is about more than getting them to pick up a book; it's equally important for children to appreciate a good story.

"I think it's important to make sure you read to them as much as they read for themselves or other people, making it a more supportive environment".

"Spend once a week saying, 'Right, I'm going to read to you', I think really encourages them to appreciate it. The older students in particular haven't been read to at home for so long that they absolutely love it."

Anything goes

"It's crucial to bear in mind what the student wants to read". "Having this control shouldn't be undervalued, and I think they should be allowed to venture from one type of book to another.

"Introduce your children to a wide variety of texts, mediums and genres — they may surprise themselves once they have faced preconceived ideas about what they consider enjoyable and embrace a diversity in what they read. Comics, e-books, short stories, online articles and magazines shouldn't be ignored."

"Children respond well to it because they love exploring details of books and making books come to life.

Encourage your children to read for pleasure, the opportunities books provide are endless!




Catholic Value 4: Search for Truth and Wisdom
