Cyber Safety

Social media and technology has made the ability to communicate with our family, friends and work situations easier and quicker across society and the world. There are many forms and benefits, however, there are dangers too.

Most social media applications (apps such as House Party, Roblox, TikTok, Kik, Snapchat or Facetime Messenger for example) have age restrictions that the users are a minimum of 13 years old. Therefore, children from Trinity should not be using them. Some of these apps do allow for parent consent, but usually between the ages of 13-18. Devices such as PlayStations, X-Box and games such as Fortnite or Roblox provide a platform for 'in-game' chats and video link where part of the playing with others includes playing anonymously with people that the players have not met in person – these players include adults.

It has come to our attention that there are many students using social media apps on technological devices to communicate with one another after school hours. At times, it has been inappropriate with the use of offensive language as well as rude, derogatory and racist comments to and about other students, teachers and parents. Unfortunately, these devices, games and apps also provide a forum for cyber bullying, exclusion and invasion of privacy. This behaviour can have a negative impact on your child's wellbeing and learning particularly when issues are carried over into the school environment.

It is strongly urged that parents strictly monitor the use of technology, and social media apps and the content of the communication your children are using.

At school the use of these apps are not allowed and breaches the 'Acceptable use of technology' policy and agreement.




Congratulations to Kindy on achieving another Goanna reward. Well done what an awesome effort.
