Dear Parents and Caregivers

As we begin the school holidays, and some more free time for children at home, there are greater opportunities for the children to access technologies and social media. For all the benefits that social media and technology has made for the ability to communicate with our family, friends and work situations to be easier and quicker across society and the world, it is a timely reminder that there are dangers too.

Most social media applications (apps such as House Party, Roblox, TikTok, Kik, Snapchat or Facetime Messenger for example) have age restrictions that the users are a minimum of 13 years old. Therefore, children from Trinity should not be using them. Some of these apps do allow for parent consent, but usually between the ages of 13-18. Devices such as PlayStations, X-Box and games such as Fortnite or Roblox provide a platform for 'in-game' chats and video link where part of the playing with others includes playing anonymously with people that the players have not met in person — these players include adults.

Unfortunately, these devices, games and apps also provide a forum for cyber bullying, exclusion and invasion of privacy. This behaviour can have a negative impact on your child's wellbeing and learning particularly when issues are carried over into the school environment.

It is strongly urged that parents strictly monitor the use of technology, and social media apps and the content of the communication your children are using.

Sacred Space

Religious Education in the Diocese of Parramatta has undergone much change in the last two years. Term 3 2020 marks the next step towards a new curriculum that will replace 'Sharing Our Story', the current curriculum that has been in place for over 20 years.

The process of developing a new approach, currently known as the Draft New Curriculum, has been a collaboration with students, parents, teachers, clergy and system leaders. This innovative and ambitious project has led to the development of Learning Cycles (one per term), that apply scripture and tradition in a meaningful way to the contemporary life of young people. This endeavour supports our students to grow in faith and understanding through prayer, reason and action in daily life.

In Term 3, using experiential learning through student inquiry, students in Stage 3 (year 6) will engage with one Learning Cycle (The Challenges and opportunities of Interfaith Relations) from the Draft New Curriculum. In Term 4, year 5 will engage with a learning cycle.

In preparation for the 2021 implementation, teachers are continuing to participate in extensive theological formation and professional learning.

This is an exciting opportunity for our faith community of Trinity Catholic Primary School, to further exclaim our commitment to empowering all our young people to discover a meaningful and flourishing life.

We look forward to sharing this journey with you throughout the term and will keep you updated about opportunities that will extend the learning experience further for students and their families.

Semester One Reports

Semester One reports have been sent home today. They look different from the reports you are used to as they reflect the period of remote learning during terms one and two. Those parents who registered for an optional phone interview have received the code to book an online appointment, which will be held in week 1 of next term. Please ensure you record your interview time in your calendar.

The teachers look forward to communicating with you via the phone calls. To ensure that the appointment schedule runs smoothly please adhere to the following protocols:

- understand that the phone call appointment is for a maximum of 10 minutes and that other parents will be waiting for their scheduled appointment. If you need a longer appointment please negotiate this with the class teacher for another day and time
- ensure that you are ready to receive your phone call 10mins either side of the scheduled time ie 10mins before/10 mins after
- if the teacher is using a mobile phone the call will come through with "No Caller ID". Please answer the call
- teachers are happy for you to use speaker phone if both parents will be talking with the teacher during the appointment
- teachers will call twice only to try and connect with you. If you miss the call made by the teacher please contact the school the next day to reschedule.

Evacuation Drill



Reading During The Holidays Is Important

Create a holiday tradition of reading

Allow your child to 'show-off' their great reading by suggesting they read to a holiday visitor. Most children usually love the chance to demonstrate their reading skills to friends and family. Reading during the holidays can really be an enjoyable and productive tradition for the entire family.

Record your child's reading

Please continue to record your child's reading in their RED Journal, even during the holidays. This is a fun way for your child to get recognition for reading at home and to share this with their peers and teachers when school returns.



PBS4L



PBS4L stands for Positive Behaviour 4 Learning. At Trinity we agree to 3 PBS4L expectations:

We are SAFE
We are RESPECTFUL
We are LEARNERS

Current Goanna Goal: We look after our own, our peers, and the schools equipment.

Have you met our PBS4L team? The PBS4L team includes Kaiah, Liam, Zeti and Brodie. They are responsible for encouraging the students to follow the

goanna goal.



Did you know that we have PBS4L lessons?

At the start of every year, the students relearn the matrix expectations with a daily lesson for the first four weeks of school. This also allows new students to understand the behaviour expectations at Trinity.

Every three weeks the students engage in a new booster lesson to help teach and consolidate the positive behaviour we are aiming to see at Trinity. We introduce the new goanna goal for this period and reteach the expectations for this area of our behaviour matrix. The students have a chance to practice the behaviour to make connections between the expectations and the choices and behaviours they need to be displaying. Students who regularly display the desired behaviours for the goanna goal then earn a goanna token. When a student reaches ten goanna tokens, they earn a Mamre award which is handed out at assembly.
